




<u>Chinese New Year - Kung Hei Fatt Choy</u> 2021: Year of the Ox

Dragon & Lion Dancers

During Chinese New Year celebrations, groups of dancers perform and bring to life dragon and lion costumes. The Lion costumes traditionally have 2 dancers and the dragon costume has a team of dancers. Cabbages are left outside shops and restaurants to attract the lions and dragons to bring good luck into the buildings. Firecrackers are set off to scare off evil spirits and bring good luck with the New Year.






